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Update December 8: COVID Cases and Deaths Among People with Disabilities and Older Adults in Wisconsin

(Madison) – The Survival Coalition of more than 30 disability organizations supports the work of the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and the Governor Evers’ administration to share regularly updated data regarding the impacts of COVID-19 in Wisconsin’s Medicaid Adult Home and Community-Based Services system. People with disabilities and older adults, particularly those who live in congregate or group settings have proven to be particularly vulnerable to the virus.

Medicaid HCBS waiver program COVID-19 deaths as percent of statewide total COVID-19 deaths	17.5%

Participants in Wisconsin’s waiver programs, typically referred to as Family Care and IRIS, comprise 17.5% of the state’s total deaths.

According to DHS data, 26.2% of cases in the waiver system result in hospitalization and 9.6% result in death, compared to 4.4% and .9% in the general state population, respectively.
